






THE CROSS

The cross best proclaims the indisputable fact that we worship a caring God. It is the most popular of all Christian symbols. There is no Christianity without a cross. The cross shouts God's words of love to each of us. In it is hope for the hopeless, encouragement for the depressed, and the pronouncement of life for those who grieve the loss of a loved one or friend. Its importance to our faith cannot be overemphasized!!!! Its proclamation must never be subdued.

In Calvary God was in Christ reconciling the world to himself. The blood of Christ pouring down the cross **restored our broken relationship** with the Father. We can never fully understand God's mysterious plan to restore a creation gone astray, but we do know that everyone who comes to the cross in simple trusting faith are cleansed by Christ's blood and find peace with God.



EASTER!!

"Make it as secure as you can," Pilate tells the soldiers of the tomb of Jesus. During major sports events, the Academy Awards, the Olympics, we understand now that security is of the most importance – "Make it as secure as you can." Easter worship surrenders that impulse to create security to the ONE in whom we find our real security. The ONE who shakes the earth with the truth of resurrection is the ONE in whom we find ourselves and our hopes secure. God has raised Jesus Christ and entrusted to him absolutely everything because only the ONE who has suffered and died can be trusted with the precious things of human life. The angel gives us the message to share with each other: "He is going to Galilee; there you will see him." This is the Good News of Easter. "Don't look back at the empty tomb," the angel says, "he is not there, he has been raised."

I want to extend a personal invitation to you to join worship on Easter Sunday and each week throughout the Easter season. There are some commercials on TV which say, "It doesn't get any better than this." Christians reserve such praise for Easter!! Easter is the crown of the whole year, the queen of feasts, the highest Christian festival. Easter is the richest and most joyous season of the year. Truly, it doesn't get any better than this!!

So, don't miss out. Easter Sunday will be our first in-person worship since last March. The Festival of Easter, followed by the season of Easter (which lasts 7 weeks) is a time to awaken from sleep, to come alive, to begin anew. Don't let lesser concerns crowd out the joy and excitement of Easter. Don't let anything separate you from the God who delights in Easter surprises. Make the Easter Season your top priority!

For it is true, Christ is risen! He is risen indeed! ALLELUIA!

JOYS OF SUNDAY SCHOOL

Jesus said to his disciples: "Let the little children come to me: do not stop them for it is to such of these that the kingdom of God belongs." Mark 10:14

Yay! The two May Sunday School sessions will meet in person at church!! On the second Sunday in March our Bible story was in the Book of John 3:14-21, and we learned very special news about Jesus. Did you know Jesus is the Light of the World? We also learned one of the most important verses in the Bible is John3:16, and that Jesus is a gift to us from God. That verse says, "For God so loved the world that he gave his only son, so that everyone who believes in him may not perish but have eternal life. In this passage it also says that people loved darkness, not light, because people were doing wrong things in the dark where no one could see, but those who do what is good come to the light, because that's where God is.

To remember that Jesus is the light of the world and that his love has given us eternal life, we made glow-in-the-dark crosses. To follow Jesus, we try to show Jesus' love to everyone we meet. Can we do this? Sure we can, because the Holy Spirit will help us. How wonderful is that? Miss Barb suggested the kids sing, "This Little Light of Mine" and "Whisper A Prayer."

The fourth Sunday in March, we had a VERY LONG Bible passage to read, from the book of Mark 11:1-11, 14:1-15:47. We divided up the verses so the children and their families could read one section each day of Holy Week. We hoped it would help them understand a little more about how special EASTER is. We learned that Jesus lived a human life on earth, one with lots of ups & downs, just like us. Ups & downs are just part of life. This text is a good example of that. In today's story, Jesus comes at a time in his life on earth when he has fulfilled everything God wants him to do. Even then, Jesus' life is filled with extremes of good & bad. Still, Jesus walks on, toward the cross and the giving of our salvation. Miss Barb sent us two songs to sing, "God's Promise" and "Fishers of Men."

Jesus Christ, my living hope!


Hallelujah! Praise the One who set me free!

This last year has been challenging for all of us. LSSI has remained committed to serving the whole person, listening with empathy and compassion just as we have since 1867. By promoting the dignity of people, valuing the diversity of human life, and helping people realize their full potential, we transform one life at a time. A ripple effect is felt as that transformation impacts and creates stronger relationships with others.

Whom LSSI Serves

Between July 1, 2019 and June 30, 2020 LSSI's services helped almost 44,000 children, adults, and seniors throughout Illinois. That is one of every 289 people in

30% of children served by LSSI's Children's Community Services are under 5 years; and 18% of people served in all LSSI programs are between 25-34 years.

the state.

94% of LSSI's primary clients have household incomes below \$25,000; 74% have incomes below \$5.000.

MISSION STATEMENT

Responding to the Gospel, Lutheran Social Services of Illinois (LSSI) brings healing, justice, and wholeness to people and communities.

COVID-19 Response

The COVID-19 pandemic has impacted all of us. LSSI continued critical services while also following necessary safety guidelines to support our clients and staff. We continue to focus on our mission and provide services wherever and whenever possible.

LSSI was 1 of 18 Illinois nonprofits who received funding through the 2nd round of the Illinois COVID-19 Response Fund, helping us provide direct support to the people we serve; 4,368 individuals were served as a result of this grant.

As the largest provider of $Foster\ Care\ Services$ in Illinois,

we care for children who have been removed from their birth families due to abuse and/or neglect and we place them with foster families who receive training and support from LSSI. Our primary goal is to help children find their forever home, either by reunification with birth families whenever possible or through adoption.

LSSI continues to provide specialized Therapeutic Foster Care through an evidence-based treatment program that places children with histories of severe trauma and emotional/behavioral needs into single-family homes rather than institutional settings.

2,729 children were served through Foster Care placements.

Since May 2017, LSSI's Therapeutic Foster Care program has enrolled 59 children with 33 youth successfully completing the program.

Intact Family Services

Designed to stabilize, strengthen, enhance, and preserve family life by enabling children to remain safely at home, Intact Family Services works with families who have come to the attention of Illinois DCFS.

1,254 families were enrolled in this program.



LSSI's Strategic Planning

To guide our mission, LSSI developed a 3-year strategic plan, with a primary focus on outcomes of dignity, full potential, and health and wellbeing. We will continue to respond with wholeperson, value-based services by building and strengthening the ecosystems that connect and integrate care for children, adults, and families.



The Storybook Project

With the help of dedicated, well-trained volunteers and donated new children's books, LSSI's Storybook Project continues to connect incarcerated parents with their children. At 14 Illinois prisons and jails, incarcerated moms and dads read and record a book. LSSI mails the book and recording to their child.

3,703 children received books from their incarcerated parents through 67 events before the pandemic temporarily suspended

Affordable Housing

For older adults and people over the age of 18 with disabilities, LSSI provides affordable housing at 20 housing sites throughout Illinois. A Social Service Coordinator is available at every site to assist residents.

LSSI provided affordable housing to 1,446 residents with an annual income between \$5,000 and \$25,000.

Alcohol and Drug Treatment

LSSI provides a full continuum of targeted Alcohol and Drug Treatment for individuals, beginning with medically assisted detox, all the way through residential care and transitional housing.

LSSI served 3,207 clients with alcohol/drug issues.

LSSI's programs consistently outperform other comparable services throughout Illinois.



Mental Health Services

LSSI's Welcoming Center is a safe, walk-in emergency department alternative for people experiencing behavioral health symptoms like anxiety, depression, bi-polar disorder, substance use, and post-traumatic stress. Project IMPACT (Immediate Multidisciplinary Pre-Screening Assessment Crisis Team) uses a creative wrap-around behavioral health model with trained counselors available 24 hours a day, every day, to help people experiencing a behavioral, psychiatric, or addiction crisis. LSSI's Step-Up School-Based Counseling services partner with 58 Chicago Public Schools to provide needed mental health care to grammar and high school-age students.

LSSI provided critical mental health services to 18,660 clients.











BOARD BRIEFS
