

















Importance of Daily Devotions

Daily devotions or quiet times are time spent each day dedicated to relating with God. When people speak of daily devotions, they are usually referring to a time of reading their Bible, doing a Bible study, or reading a devotional book, accompanied by a time of prayer. Some may simply pray. Some also include musical worship. No matter the format of a daily devotional time, it is important.



God desires a relationship with us. He created us and has redeemed us for this very purpose. These relationships are intimate. Intimacy takes time to build. We spend time – daily if possible – with those we love. This time is meant to further our knowledge of one another as well as give us enjoyment.

When we spend daily devotional time with God, we submit our will to His. God is in the details of our lives (Matthew 6:25-33). He cares about the details of each day with the love of a father or spouse and also with the interest of a master. We seek to further God's kingdom. Coming to Him each day is one way to know which direction to move. Daily devotions help us learn truth. When we spend time in God's Word, we gain wisdom and understanding.

Daily spending time with God is a way to worship Him. Time is a limited resource. What we spend our time on is an indication of what we value. When we spend time with God, we demonstrate that we value Him. We claim that He is worthy of attention and of praise.

God is our refuge (Psalm 46). Life is often chaotic and confusing. When it is, we run to God. If we desire to truly find rest and safety in God, it is helpful to know Him well. Such deep knowledge comes from daily time spent with Him. Daily devotions is a spiritual discipline that helps us get to know God, that ensures we stay connected to Him (John 15:1-8), that teaches us truth, that provides a place for worship, and that functions as a daily shelter in the midst of the storms of life.

Doing Good with RIP Medical Debt

More than 700 families across New Mexico and parts of Arizona are seeing their medical debt evaporate, thanks to St. Bede's Episcopal Church Santa Fe.

The church funded forgiveness for the families' medical debts through a \$15,000 donation to RIP Medical Debt — enough to cover all outstanding debts in the entire state of New Mexico and then some.

RIP Medical Debt identifies impoverished households that owe medical debt, buys that debt at pennies on the dollar, and pays it off with donations. The charity also notifies the debtor and credit agencies that the debt is cleared.

With its donation, St. Bede's parish wiped out nearly \$1.4 million of medical debt for 782 households.

That evening, he went to a bar. He was still nervous and trembling. He spilled his drink on the table by accident. The waiter apologized and gave him a napkin to clean himself. The Janitor mopped the floor. The female manager offered him a complimentary drink. She also gave him a huge hug and a peck while saying, "Don't worry man. Who doesn't make mistakes?". He has not stopped going to that bar since then.

<u>Lesson</u>: Sometimes our attitude as believers drives souls away from God. You can make a difference by how you treat people especially when they make mistakes.


